LEARNING A NEW SKILL

THE SKI SLOPE IS THE IDEAL 'OUTDOOR CLASSROOM'

In a nutshell, a snowsports trip is a chance for students to learn a new physical skill, acquire knowledge and participate in healthy exercise in an unfamiliar, but controlled, environment. It's often the first time a student has left home – an excellent opportunity for them to gain independence, self–discipline, confidence, as well as facing fears and pushing their own limits safely and successfully. It also presents numerous occasions to implement language and improve social skills. Links to the National Curriculum and educational objectives are numerous, as we'll go on to explain.

All in all, participating in a school snowsports trip is a unique opportunity to acquire important building blocks to create a rounded young person, in preparation for adult life

MUCH MORE THAN JUST A TRIP ABROAD! UK NATIONAL CURRICULUM LINKS

The experiences gained through snowsports – physical, sporting, mental, social – are immense and to exclude these opportunities from school life would be misplaced. Snowsports fit well within, and can link to, just about any part of the curriculum through considered and informed planning.

Each Key Stage is designed to build upon the aims of its predecessor, so any opportunities to use and develop fluency in a noted National Curriculum aim, supports the purpose of the curriculum itself.

Key examples of the integration of snowsports into the curriculum are:

PSHERISK TAKERS - KNOWLEDGEABLE - SKILFUL THINKERS




The PSHE programme is expected to equip pupils with a sound understanding of risk and the knowledge and skills necessary to make safe and informed decisions. It is also required to build on statutory guidance on financial education, and the importance of physical activity and diet for a healthy lifestyle.



A snowsports instructor will demonstrate and teach the importance of safety on the slopes (Ski Way Code) and the risks involved. These are of huge importance in a mountain environment where conditions can change unexpectedly and instant decisions/change of course may need to be made. An instructor will also explain the importance of a good diet to fuel the high activity levels required on the course. Lessons will take place under qualified supervision of snowsports professionals and students placed in ability groups which will push them to reach their maximum potential. Pre-trip exercises are another way students can get involved prior to the course. Après-ski may also present additional physical activities – dancing, ice-skating, swimming, snow tubing, bum boarding etc. All contribute to the uptake of an active lifestyle, meeting the government agenda to combat inactivity and obesity.





CITIZENSHIP PLAYING A FULL & ACTIVE PART IN SOCIETY



KS3-4 - The different environment, with the residential aspects, helps develop independence, and provides pupils with knowledge, skills and understanding to help prepare them to play a full and active part in society as responsible citizens. This covers a wide range of activities across and beyond the curriculum.



Students will share new experiences with their peers and develop relationships with not only their own teachers, but also instructors, drivers, hotel reps etc. On the coach, the hotel, the slopes, the après-ski events,

there may also be a chance to interact with students from other schools. There's also the opportunity to have direct contact with foreign nationals (hotel staff, local shops, mountain restaurants etc).

Students will gain the knowledge, skills and understanding they need to lead confident, healthy, independent lives and to become informed, active and responsible citizens.

IMPROVING CONFIDENCE

As well as learning new skills, a ski trip is a great opportunity for children to experience staying away from home, becoming more independent, confident and self-reliant

ENGLISH Let the imagination run wild!




The overarching aim for English in the National Curriculum is to promote high standards of language and literacy by equipping students with a strong command of the spoken and written word.



KS2 – Gives practice in reading reference/research material in the build up to the trip. With its level and variety of new experiences, the snowsports trip also presents the opportunity to use the visit as a vehicle for further study. This may include follow up of the trip by encouraging the students to write about their experience (stories, poems, schools newsletter articles etc), or prepare a presentation for other students. This in turn develops into an opportunity to practise grammar, punctuation, vocabulary and writing skills, relating them to a real event. Presenting this concisely to peers uses spoken English to support the written word.




KS 3 & 4 - Being in close proximity to peers, instructors and teachers, provides practice in communication skills at varying levels, developing vocabulary, confidence and competence in spoken languages. Students learn to speak 'confidently, audibly and effectively', as outlined by the National Curriculum.



MATHEMATICS BRINGING FIGURES TO LIFE!



The National Curriculum aims to ensure that all pupils become increasingly fluent in the fundamentals of mathematics, so that they develop a conceptual understanding and an ability to recall and apply knowledge rapidly and accurately. A snowsports trip provides a 'real world' application for these aims. This may involve measuring, handling data (tables, charts and graphs and their interpretation), calculations and solving problems before, during and after the course.



KS 3 – Daily shopping in a foreign country requires students to recall and apply knowledge of unit pricing and exchange rates, developing mathematical fluency and supports an interest in personal finances. This is developed further in KS4, where ability to convert units, such as prices, is a specific National Curriculum aim. It also brings in a link to Geography, and requires students to understand compass bearings which are practised in a mountain environment.



GETTING VALUE FOR MONEY

School ski trips are a great value way of enabling children to try a snowsport, especially if a family ski holiday isn't a possibility





SCIENCEREAL WORLD SCIENCE



A snowsports trip provides a wide range of opportunities to explain things in scientific terms and see the 'real world' applications.



KS 2 – A snowsports trip perfectly demonstrates the effects of exercise on body systems, such as circulatory and respiratory systems, as well as the impact of diet, exercise and lifestyle on the way bodies function.



KS3 – Energy transfers, forces, motion, speed, physical changes (such as freezing and melting), measurements, bio-mechanics, the skeleton and muscular system, and general health – snowsports present a variety of scientific concepts. Even the sound waves involved in echoes! All require scientific explanation, which can be further explored in the classroom or used as an example of a concept studied.

KS4 – `Curiosity about the natural world' is further developed. A student's day-to-day presence in a mountain environment provides an excellent opportunity to note and discuss important key aspects of the earth (rocks, soil etc.), atmospheric science, weather, global warming effects (habitats and adaptations), common atmospheric pollutants and Earth's resources (including the water cycle). Again, these can be followed up on return to school.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION LET'S GET MOVING!



Snowsports are not difficult sports to learn, relying on technique rather than strength or fitness and can be a great leveller among students and their peer group. Students who have previously shown little or no enthusiasm in sport often discover an unexpected aptitude and skill. Snowsports are accessible to everyone, including those with disabilities or special needs.



KS2 – The aim is for students to take part in an outdoor, adventurous activity, with review, demonstrating improvement to achieve their personal best. It is possible to include swimming as an après-ski activity. Other activities could include ice skating and a range of other après-ski events. Snowsport lessons are available for all skill levels, with on-the-move teaching provided by qualified professionals using the latest teaching techniques



KS3 & 4 - 4 hours a day on-the-move ski instruction, to a recognised BASI programme, with constant assessment, encouragement and confidence building, followed by a certificate of achievement at the end, is a perfect

way to see improvements made in the 'outdoor and adventurous activity'. It also enables pupils to 'analyse their performances compared to previous ones and demonstrate improvement to achieve their personal best'. They are physically active for sustained periods of time and are leading 'healthy, active lives'. KS4 of the National Curriculum also requires that students 'continue to take part regularly in competitive sports and activities outside school'. This can be achieved by visits to a nearby ski slope, family ski trips or booking again for the next school ski trip!

KS5 – For A Level PE & Sport, candidates will find that there is something for each of the six content areas laid down by the AQA examination board in the actual skiing activity itself. Interski may be able to provide filming to support GCSE and A Level courses and/or provide snowsport career-orientated talks.

GEOGRAPHYTEXT BOOK PICTURES COME TO LIFE!



The National Curriculum requires a knowledge and understanding of places, patterns and processes, environmental change and sustainable development. Forget pictures and diagrams in text books - geography takes on a whole new meaning in a mountainous environment. Even en route, there's the drive down through regions of the UK, the Channel crossing as well as the changing scenery between Calais and resort to witness. For many, this may be their very first experience of travel beyond their immediate locality.

KS2 - Practises location of countries in Europe as part of the build up to the trip.

KS3 - Travel abroad into Europe helps 'consolidate and extend knowledge of the World's major countries and their physical and human features'. Being on the mountain exposes students directly to the formation of landscapes and environments, particularly scale and unique weather conditions. The reading of piste maps involves some basic map skills and orientation. An après-ski activity which includes a tour. walking trail or time in the local town involves some map reading and teamwork, as well

EXPERIENCING A NEW COUNTRY

Ski trips introduce children to new countries, cultures and customs. It's a great opportunity to try out a few local phrases and sample the local cuisine.

HISTORY BETTER THAN READING A STUFFY HISTORY BOOK!



Knowledge and understanding of events, people and changes in the past comes to life when witnessed first-hand.

From the spectacular Roman ruins, beautiful churches and fascinating archaeological sites of Aosta town, to the ancient castles which dot the region and the numerous festivals which take place throughout the year, the Aosta Valley is brimming with history and



KS3 - The Roman ruins in Aosta show an insight into significant aspects of the history of the wider world such as the nature of ancient civilisation and the expansion and 'Roman Empire' study topic?

KS2-5 - There's no greater inspiration for those with a leaning towards Art than the stunning scenery of the Alps. Photography tends to be practised routinely on a snowsports trip - it's a great way of creating memories, showing friends and family back home, and posting on social media. Filters can be applied and stunning artworks produced. Students could also be encouraged to record observations in a sketch book too, and the imagination can be fired for future art projects at school. Students could also put presentations together of the trip upon return to school.




BEING INSPIRED

ICT AUDIO-VISUAL CONTENT



KS2-4 - Students could follow up the ski trip with a Powerpoint, or similar, presentation for other students, using a range of audio and visual content. Again, they could use social media to post photos, stories and videos of their time on the slopes.



Taking a phone or tablet with them on the trip allows students to understand their safe use, as well as using it to enhance their trip as a camera or entertainment source.

LANGUAGES COMMUNICATION IN AN AUTHENTIC ENVIRONMENT



KS2-5 - As a snowsports trip is usually residential in a foreign country, students studying languages get an opportunity to 'communicate for practical purposes', listening to, and speaking, the language in an 'authentic' environment. There's the breakfast stop in France en route often a student's first step on foreign soil - and the excitement of that first practice of the foreign word outside the classroom. In resort, students will come into daily contact with native speakers (hotel staff, mountain restaurants, shops and supermarkets). This results in broadening their vocabulary and developing confidence. The Aosta Valley is a bi-lingual area with both French and Italian spoken.
